# The Closure of Summer



**GROWING UP IN MEYERSDALE, AND** as a past member of Buffalo Creek 4-H, I always looked forward to and made sure never to miss the Somerset County Fair. I can remember my mom working at Krause's food booth while I enjoyed rides with friends and volunteered with my high school sports teams to park cars or serve food at the firefighter's stand.

Demolition Derby Night was always a family event because my dad participated. Now, years later, it is still a family tradition

to watch my brother as he enters the derby each year. My aunts, uncles, cousins, and family friends crowd together in the grandstands with our 4-H milkshakes in one hand and a bag of kettle corn in the other as we watch the mud fly and cars dwindle down to the winner.

In 2009, I competed for Somerset County Fair Queen and that will always be an experience I will never forget. The fair represented the closure of summer for me growing up as it was the last week before we started back to school.

As a recently hired employee at Somerset Rural Electric Cooperative (REC), I'm still looking forward to visiting the fair this year, but in a much different role. At the fair, Somerset REC has a booth, where you'll find employees who are ready to answer your questions about anything at the co-op. Most members and non-members think we only provide electricity, but we truly offer so much more. The fair provides an excellent opportunity for the cooperative's staff to meet our members in person and support a community event. Since 2001, the co-op has been supporting the junior livestock sale by purchasing 4-H animals and, in most cases, donating them back to the organization.

A few items at the co-op's fair booth include a sample Marathon hot water tank, HVAC informational pamphlets, and multiple displays that explain the differences in lightbulb wattage, light color, and home insulation types. Our lightbulb wattage display shows you the different styles of lightbulbs available and their respective wattage. It also demonstrates how four LED bulbs are equivalent to one incandescent bulb. The color comparison part of the display shows the difference between warm white, soft white, cool white and bright white bulbs, as well as the difference between natural light versus daylight. Finally, our insulation chart shows the difference between fiberglass, cellulose, and foam insulation based on R-value and air penetration. And of course, we can't forget the kids! Bring them by the booth to grab a color-changing pencil, coloring book and more.

The Somerset County Fair runs Aug. 20-26 in Meyersdale. Be sure to stop by our booth in Exhibit Hall 3 (in the corner closest to the main parking lot) to see our new and improved fair booth and sign up for this year's giveaway! We hope to see you there so we can show you everything that Somerset REC has to offer to our members and community. Our employees can answer any of your questions about the co-op and our future events. 2

# **Youth Tour: An Unforgettable Experience**

Association Youth Tour is a week for high school juniors and chaperones to fully engage in a truly unforgettable experience in Washington, D.C. Students acquire leadership skills, learn about our nation's capital, build friendships that will last forever, and so much more.

Attending a trip away from home requires many students to step out of their comfort zone, meet new people and experience new things. Approximately 1,800 students from across rural America gather in Washington, D.C., for this all-inclusive week of touring our nation's most captivating monuments and memorials.

In June, Somerset Rural Electric Cooperative (REC) sponsored 11 students from Somerset County to participate in this once-in-a-lifetime trip. Students visited the Holocaust Memorial Museum, the Smithsonian museums, the World War II Memorial and the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial, just to name a few. Students also went on a dinner boat cruise and bowling, visited the Washington National Zoo, participated in a Co-ops 101 course and saw "The Lion King" at the John F. Kennedy Center. Students also visited Capitol Hill to meet with lawmakers and get an inside look at democracy in action.

Prospective high school juniors who are interested in attending Youth Tour must fill out an application and attend an interview at the cooperative. This interview allows the judges to learn more about the students' involvement in their school and community and extracurricular activities.
